British Library Centre for Conservation, St Pancras, London: with the British Library and Qatar Foundation digitisation project

An opportunity to see the facilities and work of the Centre for Conservation where around 1,900 items are conserved every year and the dedicated and specially-designed digitisation, preparation, conservation and imaging studios of the British Library and Qatar Foundation for Education, Science and Community Development (QF).

Tour B 2 tons, am and pm

British Library Sound Archive, St Pancras, London

Tour of the British Library Centre for Conservation audio studios. These studios are dedicated to digital preservation of the Library's audio collections, which contain over 3 million recordings dating back to the late 19th century. There will be a chance to see some of the specialist equipment and speak to the engineers who are responsible for preserving the content of old and new audio carriers.

Tour C 08.30 - 18.00

High Density Storage Facility, Boston Spa, Yorkshire

A rare opportunity to visit our Yorkshire site and learn about our two, low-oxygen, high density storage building projects, one for low use periodicals and one for the national newspaper collection. The day will include lunch, a presentation about both buildings and a guided tour of the low use periodicals store -including a view of the storage voids from our special viewing gantry.
